



DISCIPLESHIP Fast Track Class

We have a wonderful opportunity to read the Bible through together. It doesn't require a scholarly understanding for I have found that it is written for the simplest of us. The fast track allows us to get an overview of the whole Bible without getting bogged down in theological concepts. Here are some suggestions that have helped me achieve the reading assignments.



- † Read the text in your favorite version. A version like the Message is easier.
- † Listen and follow or just listen to it. If you have an iPad, iPhone, or maybe even a Mac computer you can download a free Bible with many versions called "You Version". It has an audio version available. Free bibles are widely available for all PC users.
- † Skim through the chapters noting the various themes listed in most Bibles. Find one that particularly catches your attention; read through that passage.

The program we will be using gives a few questions each session to spur your personal application and interest. I have found this to make it much more meaningful than simply reading the Bible.

The Bible, I have found, is the Christian's manual for understanding our purpose in this life. It is a whole book with a beginning, a middle, and an end. The overall theme is the Love and Glory of God as He relates to mankind.

Join us on this adventure in understanding God and our faith.

I went to Kennedy, Woodlawn, Lynch, back to Woodlawn, and finally Vernon grade schools and then on to Jefferson High School. My main interest in school was academics and music. I was always in the choir and sang my first duet in public in seventh grade. During high school, I was in the Swing Sixteen as well as choir.

As a family, most of our vacations were camping or trips to the California relatives. Of course, camping at the coast always involved clam digging - love those razors! We also took in places like Crater Lake. Weekends were spent as a family often visiting with relatives (there were a lot of us in this area) and driving around the country. Picnics on the Sandy River were a regular gathering for family and friends. We had a wonderful family life.

I can't ever remember not being in Sunday School and church. I even have those attendance pins we earned. When I was in sixth grade, we moved the last time to NE 22nd; and when looking for a new church, Mom found Alberta Evangelical United Brethren Church. We visited once and never went anywhere else. Alberta was one of the three churches that merged to become Tabor Heights EUB and eventually United Methodist. Of course I sang in the choir; and when I was in high school, I remember often arriving at church, the pastor greeted me right away saying they had no special music for that Sunday, and would I please sing a certain song he had picked out. This is also where I volunteered to do the Sunday bulletin as it was produced by the pastor and was full of mistakes! Guess that led to my eventual secretarial/administrative positions! I was also active in Youth for Christ. I had the good fortune to go to Troutcreek Bible Camp and Jennings Lodge Camp every year.

I met Val while in high school. We were married at Alberta EUB in 1958. Val died in June 2012. We had a wonderful life together. We have three children and seven grandkiddos. I have great memories of our years together.

A Call to be Aware, and a Request for Deep Prayer By Marilee Miller

John Wesley's followers were called Methodists because members abided under guidelines instead of each person having their own set of beliefs. Today we are called United Methodists because three like-minded groups merged into one denomination.

This spring, the U. S. Supreme Court instituted same-sex marriage and various rights for lesbian, gay, bi-sexual, and transsexual persons. In May, the Methodist General Conference (the highest governing body in our church) started a dialog on the implications of the Supreme Court decision. It was to culminate in a later vote, perhaps a year or more away, on the formal response and whether, or how, to amend our church beliefs as stated in the Discipline.

For many years some parts of the U.S. church have advocated a "Reconciling Ministry" to be inclusive of the LGBT community, but it was rather a behind-the-scenes movement because it didn't align with the General Conference and the Book of Discipline. However, now under the Supreme Court decision it appears that certain gender rights are placed above our Biblical beliefs, such as allowing transgendered persons to use the bathroom of their gender identity. And now some UMC conferences are making changes without waiting for General Conference approval. The Western Jurisdiction has installed a lesbian bishop. Are we now faced with whether to obey our government or follow our church's longstanding beliefs? Do we know how much our freedom of religious beliefs has been abridged?

Pastor John asked me to make the congregation aware of what's happening. So I want to question Tabor Heights UMC. What do we feel about the Western Jurisdiction, and others, not waiting for a General Conference vote, or the possible re-writing of the Book of Discipline? How do we maintain our stance as a United Methodist Church if others chose their own path? I want to ask how we would respond if the Oregon-Idaho conference voted in a LGBT bishop or sent us such a pastor.

I hope we find a way to express love and compassion to the LGBT group. I'm sorry that many have been hurt by the actions and words of so-called "Christians". However, an angry, disputing atmosphere has been expressed.

Dear friends at Tabor Heights, may we start a peaceable dialog, with many prayers? I know most of us would rather just go on having "happy" lives and a "happy" church. There seem to be difficult days ahead. How will we express compassion and still be true to Biblical principles? I rejoice that Jesus Christ is Lord and ultimately, God will show his mercy and glory.



We are proud to announce that Mia Park has been admitted to the Master of Divinity program at Garrett Evangelical Theological Seminary in Evanston, IL. She left on August 29 for her first semester there. It is an honor and privilege to support her and the family as she (and they) embark on this journey.

As her church family, we desire to support her in every way we can. At Tabor Heights, we have a scholarship fund available for those in the study of ministry. Therefore, the Vision Board awarded Mia a \$5,000.00 scholarship from the Roscoe Fund for the Fall 2016 semester. 
At our last Vision Board meeting, the Board accepted and put in writing the following spending policies and we want you all to have a copy of it.

1. The annual budget is the primary authorization to pay bills for Tabor Heights United Methodist Church. All bills outside of the budget must be authorized by the Vision Board.
2. The Vision Board may delegate to others the use of funds outside of the budget and will set appropriate guidelines for amount, time, and purpose as needed. The Vision Board will retain oversight of all funds.
3. The bookkeeper will pay the authorized bills submitted that are covered by the budget. If there are insufficient funds, the bookkeeper will inform the Finance Specialist. If they are unsure of authorization then they will contact the pastor or another board member (not the one submitting the bill) for clarification as to how to pay the bill.
4. Money given for a specific purpose is temporarily restricted and can be used only for the originally stated purpose. After the purpose is fulfilled, any remaining monies will become unrestricted and will be released to the General Budget unless the Vision Board designates another use.
5. When money is solicited or accepted that is temporarily restricted, the purpose must be clearly stated as well as the policy of unrestricting stated. This will be included on the receipt.

BOOK REVIEW: HOUSE CALLS AND HITCHING POSTS

Unfairness As a lifetime resident of Ohio, before moving to Oregon six years ago, I had the opportunity to visit the Amish community many times. The quaint, modest and faithful life of these people who live a "simple" life makes an impression on the many visitors that travel to southern Ohio to purchase hand crafted piece of furniture, wood carving and many other unique crafts and toys. Their cooking and baking skills are beyond description.



When I was given the book "House Calls and Hitching Posts" by Dorcas Sharp Hoover I was delighted to be able to recall the pleasure I witnessed of the Amish lifestyle.

A country-boy-turned-country-doctor goes on house calls among the Amish of eastern Ohio in this warm collection of true-life tales. Dr. Elton Lehman relates his many stories of caring for these people who prefer a visit to his office even when a hospital trip might be necessary as well as his experiences when delivering babies in a home environment. He is often taught valuable lessons of faith when a child dies or an unforeseen accident occurs taking the life of a treasured husband and father. He tells of one Amish man who told the doctor he wasn't God. The doctor replied that he wants desperately to change situations, especially as he cares for dying children. The man answered by saying, "If God allows everything that happens for our good, then are you saying you would work differently than God does?"

Dr. Lehman frequently must miss his life long tradition of attending church each Sunday. All too frequently babies are delivered on a Sunday morning. Being in church for praise and adoration is an important part of the doctor's life, however, the Amish teach him that there is another dimension to worship. As he ushers a new life into the world, he understands that he is channeling God's love to those in need.

Treat yourself to Kidron, Applecreek, Millersburg and surrounding areas of Ohio as you savor the stories of these faithful followers and their cherished doctor.



MOVIE REVIEW: "Hello My Name Is Doris"

This summer the favorite movie I saw was "Hello, My Name Is Doris." It stars Sally Field who is sixty something. She develops a crush on a new, young coworker played by Max Greenfield. It is a tender hearted drama.

The ensuing story transcends grief, friendship, hoarding and family dynamics. Adult themes might be hard for young children to understand. It is rated PG and available at Red Box.

I think you will find it very funny and endearing.
